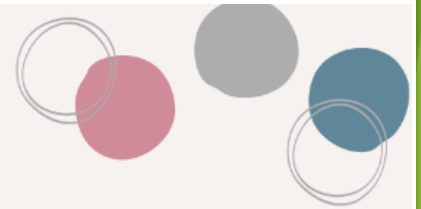

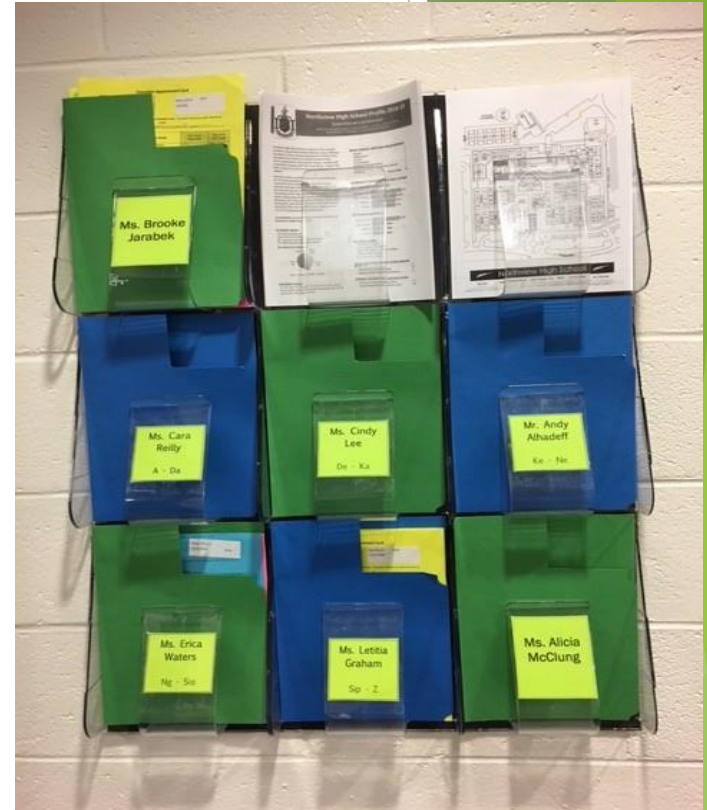

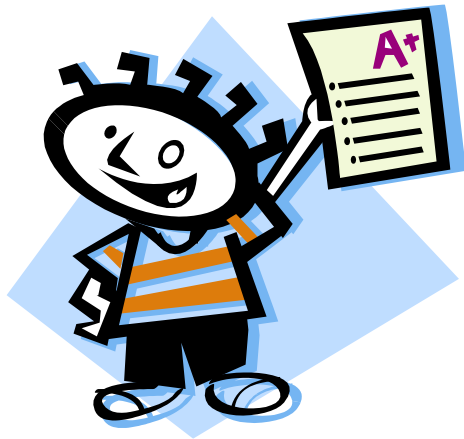

Students planning to enter/transfer into a 4 year college/university **must** take a minimum of two units of the same world language.

General Grading Policies

Interim progress reports will be available on Campus Portal to students and parents every 4.5 weeks

Report cards are issued at the end of S1 and S2; these final grades are reflected on the high school transcript

Each course semester is independent of the other; S1 and S2 course grades are NOT averaged

Honors and AP courses receive an additional 7 points added to the final passing grade

Parents can use Infinite Campus Portal to track assignments, grades, attendance, discipline, etc. during the semester

What if I fail a class?

- Summer School
 - Offered at a local high school or virtually over the summer
 - Counselor approval is required
- Virtual Credit Recovery
 - Counselor approval is required to take online classes
 - May not be offered over the summer

Credits and Honor/AP Points

- How many credits are needed to be promoted?
 - 5 credits needed at the start of Sophomore year.
 - 11 credits needed at the start of Junior year.
 - 17 credits needed at the start of Senior year.
- If retained at the start of the school year, you will be placed in your previous grade level homeroom.
- 23 Credits are REQUIRED to Graduate!
- Honors/AP points?
 - 7 additional points are awarded to a passing grade in honors, AP , and Dual Enrollment courses.

GPA or Numeric Average?

- Fulton Co. Schools does NOT provide GPA on a 4-point scale. It is only reported as a numeric average.
- Numeric Average Explanation:
 - Based on a 100-point scale.
 - All grades included on transcript, including failing grades.
 - Failed courses remain on transcript even if credit is made up.
 - Additional **7** points for passing grades in honors/AP/Dual Enrollment courses.
 - **7** points are included on transcript.

H.O.P.E. Scholarship

- Partial in-state tuition covered - varies by year
 - Payment amount for private & public colleges and universities can be located on www.gafutures.org/hope-state-aid-programs/
- Requirements:
 - Graduate from an eligible high school
 - GPA of at least a 3.0 (calculated by GSFC) in core classes and world language
 - Honors points are removed, and a 0.50 weighting is added back in for AP courses/Dual Enrollment/IB courses only, not to exceed 4.0
 - Academic Rigor: 4 classes that are academically rigorous

Zell Miller Scholarship

- 100% of in-state tuition covered
- Must meet all the requirements to be eligible for the HOPE Scholarship, plus:
 - Graduate from an eligible high school
 - GPA of at least a 3.7 (calculated by GSFC)
 - SAT: min. 1200 combined critical reading score and math score (single administration)
 - ACT: min. composite score of 26
 - *SAT/ACT scores MUST be submitted to GSFC to be considered*
 - OR Valedictorian or Salutatorian
- In college must maintain 3.3 GPA

- 4yr College/University
- 2yr Community College
- Technical College
- Military
- Workforce
- Apprenticeship
- Gap Year



4YR COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY

Students interested in attending a 4-year college and or university:

- ▶ Must meet a GPA and SAT/ACT test score requirement.
- ▶ Are eligible to earn a bachelor's degree after successfully completing course and credit requirements.
- ▶ Have access to a wide range of academic majors (area of study) in different professions.
- ▶ Take part in a more traditional educational/learning environment.
- ▶ Have the option to living on campus.
- ▶ Can go on to earn a master's and even a doctoral degree.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Community colleges traditionally served the purpose of providing:

- ▶ remediation for students in preparation for a traditional 4yr college.
- ▶ workforce training.
- ▶ community resources.

Community College:

- ▶ Is also known as junior college or two-year college.
- ▶ Provides students access to course work that earns them a 2yr **associate degree**.
- ▶ Students may be eligible to transfer to a 4yr college if the student completes an associate degree.
- ▶ Generally, does not provide on campus housing(few do) but may have athletic teams for students to participate in.



TECHNICAL COLLEGE

Students interested in attending Technical College:

- ▶ Can earn an associate degree (2yrs), complete a diploma (1-2yrs) or certificate (6-15months) program.
- ▶ Can take advantage of shorter vocational and career training programs.
- ▶ Can gain the skills needed to go into the workforce sooner, earning more money.
- ▶ May be eligible to transfer to a 4yr college if the they complete an associate degree.
- ▶ Do not need a high GPA to be admitted.
- ▶ May have to take a placement exam(Accuplacer).



APPRENTICESHIP OPPORTUNITIES

Apprenticeship is an industry-driven, high-quality career pathway where employers can develop and prepare their future workforce, and individuals can obtain paid work experience, classroom instruction, and a portable, nationally-recognized credential.

Earn as you learn with a guaranteed wage increase as you develop new skills

Receive an industry-recognized and nationally-portable credential

4YR COLLEGE VS TECHNICAL COLLEGE

4yr College:

- Offers a traditional college experience.
- Generally, higher costs to attend and more debt.
- A longer time commitment(4yrs).
- Traditional learning environments.
- Students are educated on a wide range of subjects.
- Most professional careers requires a minimum of a 4yr college degree.
- Allows students to qualify for higher career advancement.



Technical College:

- Cost less to attend which means less student loan debt.
- Provides shorter career focused programs (6mth-2yrs).
- Allows students to enter their career of choice sooner.
- Gives students career specific hands-on training.
- Students can enter high demand jobs = higher salaries.

Earn money, benefits, and the opportunity to travel while you receive both career and military training in the US Armed Forces.

PART TIME Marine Corps Reserve Marine Corps reservists train domestically and deploy with the rest of the Corps.	PART TIME Navy Reserve The Navy Reserve trains close to home. They serve in the U.S. or abroad in support of the Navy's mission.	PART TIME Air Force Reserve The Air Force Reserve trains and serves on a part-time basis, performing flying and other specialized missions for the Air Force. Air National Guard The Air National Guard trains part time to assist, first on the state level, but they may also serve nationally.		PART TIME Coast Guard Reserve The Coast Guard Reserve typically trains and serves near home, offering the chance to contribute part time and make a difference.

GAP **YEAR**


A **GAP Year** is a time-period in which recent grads take a year-long break to engage in other educational and meaningful experiences or activities such as:

- Experiencing new cultures through travel.
- Joining the Peace Corp or other service/volunteer programs.
- Participating in a Gap Year Program such as college bridge year programs.

Things to Remember:

A Gap Year should not be seen as a time-period in which a student does nothing. Students should intentionally plan for their Gap Year and seek out opportunities that will add to their personal and or educational development and growth. Students and parents are encouraged to weigh the pros and cons as a family before deciding to take a year off.

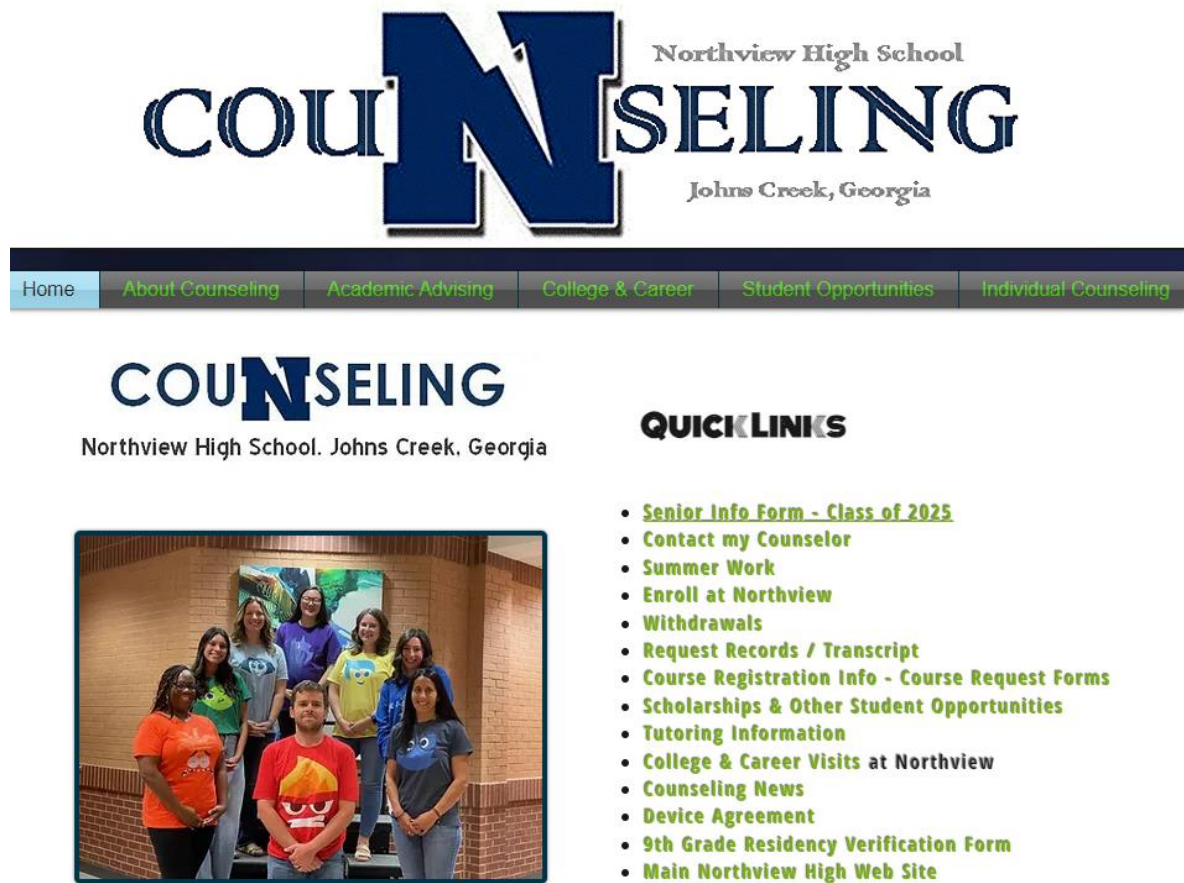
