

#### FOR COLLEGE ARMY ROTC CADETS, THE WORLD IS THEIR CLASSROOM

A junior at Florida Southern College in his hometown of Lakeland, Florida, Pedro Cuervo is majoring in political science while simultaneously enrolled in Army ROTC. As part of his college Army ROTC program, Cadet Pedro Cuervo went to Cambodia this summer to teach English to Cambodian soldiers.

Cadet Cuervo was in the top 1,000 out of the 25,000 people tested for Cultural Understanding and Language Proficiency (CULP). He was selected along with 23 other Cadets and enlisted soldiers to go to Cambodia, a trip funded through College Army ROTC and the U.S. Army Cadet Command.

Every year, hundreds of college Army ROTC Cadets travel the globe, spending up to three weeks immersed in foreign cultures, learning more about how others around the world view the U.S. and, in the

process, learning more about themselves. "It was hard not having clean water, air conditioning or soap." Cuervo said. "But



that made it a better experience for us. The soldiers respected us because we were doing all the same things they were; we were on the same level." The main goal of traveling to Cambodia was to teach the soldiers to speak English, but Cuervo said he learned about Cambodian culture such as eating a spider — which he said tasted like beef — and drinking out of a coconut while walking through the busy Cambodian streets. He also saw the Angkor Wat, the largest religious monument in the world.

Immersion into foreign cultures exposes Cadets to the realities of vastly different lifestyles, economic standing and world perspective. Dr. Forster was recently honored at the UA vs. Ole Miss football game for his service to the Nation and the University. Dr. Forster was class of 1960, commissioning with the Army into Field Artillery, then he branched into aviation. Forster was the first officer selected by the Army for astronaut training. After retiring from his 30-year Army career in 1995, he continued to excel in private industry, winning numerous awards for his contributions to aviation technology. Dr. Forster was inducted into the Army Aviation Hall of Fame in 2010. An exemplary lifelong career that began with college Army ROTC!

### IROTC TEAM TAKES IST PLACE IN NATIONAL COMPETITION



Congratulations to Norcross High School's Army JROTC Academic Team for taking top honors in the 2015 JROTC Leadership and Academic Bowl (JLAB) National Championships held in Washington D.C. A public high school located in Gwinnett County, Georgia near Atlanta, Norcross High School competed with a team of four of their IROTC Cadets.

The competition began in September 2014 with 1,708 teams from high school JROTC programs across the nation. For teams to advance, they must successfully answer progressively-difficult questions. After three rigorous rounds of academic competition, the team advanced to the National JLAB Championships held on the campus of Catholic University of America in Washington DC where they out-performed 24 other Army teams. They finished with a perfect 13–0 record, beating some of the best public and private high schools in the nation!

Sponsored by College Options Foundation, the annual JLAB competition prepares high school students for college, stressing math, science, and language arts, as well as the JROTC curriculum. ## ARMY OFFERS NEW CAREER IN CYBER TECHNOLOGY

Our job in 6th Brigade is to select, develop and commission the best Cadets for the future of the nation and our Army. We are specifically seeking college-bound students majoring in Science Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM). Upon graduation and completion of college Army ROTC, Cadets will commission as Army Officers to serve the nation and the Total Army as a full-time Active Duty Army Officer, or part-time in the Army National Guard or the U.S. Army Reserve.

Many opportunities exist in the Army for Cadets interested in STEM careers, including a career in Cybersecurity, a fast-growing industry with high-paying opportunities. The demand for cybersecurity professionals has grown 3.5 times faster than the demand for other information technology jobs over the past five years. The Army has recently created "Cyber" as functional branch for officers in order to build a professional team of elite cyber warriors to defend Army networks and provide dominant full-spectrum cyber operations.
